- How can universities keep up or even enhance quality in teaching and research when student numbers are rising, but financial means are not?
- How can we adapt and internationalise our study programmes to make our graduates "fit" for the national or even global labour market?
- How can we define international standards for the different stages of the educational system, for example with a framework of qualifications?
- And how can we sharpen the profile of our institutions and make our students and researchers more international without giving up valuable traditions?

As the voice of universities in Germany, HRK closely cooperates with rectors' conferences around the world in order to facilitate the mobility of students and researchers. We believe that sustainable cross-border education – as co-operation "at eye level" – can answer maybe not all, but at least some of the questions raised before. This is why DAAD and HRK decided to hold this conference within the framework of our joint conference series "Dialogue on Innovative Higher Education Strategies" (DIES).

Well, all that is left for me to do is to thank the co-organisers of this meeting, my colleagues at DAAD, for the good cooperation in preparing and implementing this conference.

Furthermore, I would like to thank the Ministry of Economic Cooperation and Development for supporting our conference.

I wish all of us for the two days ahead fruitful discussions, new insights and interesting encounters.
