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INTRODUCTION



European University Association (EUA)

- EUA: main representative organisation of universities (c750) and their national Rectors' Conferences (34) in 47 countries across Europe
- Mission: to ensure that universities have the means to fulfil their three-fold mission (research, teaching and services to society)
 - Policy development and advocacy
 - Support to members (projects, services & publications)
 - ✓ Particular focus on Bologna process implementation

QUALITY - AUTONOMY



Quality and institutional autonomy

Quality

- ✓ Great variety of possible approaches and definitions (fitness for purpose, compliance, excellence, enhancement, control etc.)
- Different perspectives (input, output, processes)
- No shared definition of quality along HEIs with differing missions a relative concept, primarily based on institutional mission and goals
- Quality is not a neutral concept, but closely related to questions of ideology and power

Autonomy

- ✓ "Living by ones own laws" \rightarrow self-governance
- Contract between the university and the state (but cf. relevance of other factors and actors beside the state)
- ✓ What constitutes autonomy? (cf. academic, financial, organisational and staffing autonomy in EUA Lisbon Declaration 2007)
- Ability of HEIs to make decisions and manage their affairs in the best interests of students and society (Trends V)



Bologna - quality - autonomy: key issues

- Explicit link between the institutions' responsibility for quality and autonomy in <u>Berlin Communiqué 2003</u>
- Power shift for the benefit of HEIs, away from QA agencies and governments
- Indications that in the course of the Bologna reforms, institutional autonomy has increased
 - ✓ cf. Trends III (2003): 50% of HEIs viewed their autonomy as satisfactory vs 75 % of HEIs in Trends V (2007)
- Indications that HEIs are making use of increased institutional autonomy for quality development
 - ✓ Quality Culture (2002-2006), Trends IV (2005) & V (2007)
- Implications for HEIs:
 - ✓ Stakeholder involvement (students, staff, external experts)
 - ✓ Accountability (internal and external)
